Labour Day Weekend Tour to Tabor, 10-12 March 2012

Our tour destination on the Labour Day weekend in March 2012 will be the Tabor area in Victoria's Western District. All are welcome.

In our Wendish e-News Update May 2011, we proposed a tour to the Natimuk area in March 2012. We have changed the destination to Tabor, so we can take part in the celebration of the Centenary of the present Tabor church building. As Tabor is an area where many Wendish people settled, it was decided that this opportunity was not-to-be-missed. The proposed itinerary includes the Wetland Gardens, Historical Society and Volcanic Interpretive Centre at Penshurst; Mount Rouse; St Luke's Lutheran Church Pastoral Museum; Gnadenthal properties; Herrnhut and an original 1870 homestead. Full details will be published in our next edition. The tour to Natimuk will now take place in March 2013.

Retracing the 1852 Wagon Trek from Rosenthal to Portland, 26-29 April 2012

In 2012 it will be 160 years since a group of pioneer families travelled overland from the Barossa Valley in South Australia to Portland, and eventually Hamilton, in Victoria. The families were mostly Wends led by Michael Deutscher. Families included ALBERT, BURGER, DEUTSCHER, HUF, HUNDRACK, MIRTSCHIN, PETSCHEL and RENTSCH. They left Rosenthal (now Rosedale) on 26 April 1852 in covered wagons pulled by bullocks or horses. The journey took about four weeks.

Plans are underway to re-enact the trek. The plan is to reduce the journey to four days and to travel by car rather than bullock wagon! It is anticipated that the journey will begin in Rosedale, S.A. on Thursday 26 April and end in Portland, Vic. on Sunday 29 April 2012. For further information see http://wend-ishwagontrek.com.au

Dedication of Herlitz Memorial Plaque, 29 May 2011

The dedication of the plaque marked the completion of restoration work on the gravesite of Hermann Herlitz (1834–1920). The dedication took place on Sunday 29th May in the Lutheran Section at the Melbourne General Cemetery in Carlton, Victoria.

In 1997 AKi (German Lutheran Trinity Church Historical Society) made the restoration of the grave one of its projects. Several attempts to do the work with their own human resources were unsuccessful. Undeterred, AKi kept quietly working on the project until, finally, in 2009 a financial solution presented itself which paved the way for a restoration firm to be commissioned. The restoration is now successfully completed, and the gravesite is once again in a presentable condition. Talk at Warragul Thursday 23 June 2011

John Noack was guest speaker on the topic "Who are the Wends?" to over 50 members of the West Gippsland Genealogical Society at the Warragul Old Shire Hall. His talk and pictorial illustrations dealt with five aspects of the Wends, including racial identity, geographical locations, historical background, customs and beliefs. In brief, the Slavic Wends, who were called "Venedi" by the Romans, moved from the area north of the Black Sea into northern Europe in about 500 C.E. Some settled along the River Spree in Lusatia. Customs included the wearing of unique costumes for festivals and the celebration of the bird-wedding in January. Their beliefs included traditional Slavic/Wendish and, later, Christian beliefs and customs. For further information, see our website under "The Wends".

Also mentioned was the Wendish Library in Ivanhoe, where sources for family history research are available. These include cemetery, church, civil, land and naturalisation records, as well as maps, newspapers, photographs and ships' passenger lists.

The speaker appreciated the excellent meal at Warragul's O & H Bistro and the very comfortable accommodation at the Edinburgh Motor Inn. He also inspected the nearby statue of boxer Lionel Rose and was pleased to find some book bargains at the local Opportunity Shop!

"Trove" Australian Newspapers Archive

John Simpson shared this news from Scotland:

"...I came across a facility operated by the National Library of Australia called "Trove" at http://trove.nla. gov.au/ whereby you can search newspaper articles by name. I found it very useful; I came across many references to MIATKE, LEHMANN, NOACK etc from the early days of South Australia and reading the cuttings gave me quite an insight into early colonial life."

Recently I told a noted historian in the Barossa Valley about "Trove". A few days later he reported he had found over 100 early newspaper reports he had never seen before, on events in three local towns – and he is the historian of the District who has written histories on these towns!

A tip: when searching for a surname in "Trove", it comes up with numerous old newspaper reports under "sort by relevance". Click on "sort by earliest date first", and they will appear on screen in that order.

Tours

Tour of Germany, Austria and Poland, Aug-Sept 2010

Moira Nagorcka, the writer of this report, travelled on a three-week personalized tour organized by David Zweck of Zweck Tours. The following is a continuation of her report published in the last Wendish News. This report, with photos, is also on our website under Publications /Articles.

Leipzig

Our journey from Eisenach to Leipzig included a visit to the remains of the Buchenwald Concentration Camp near the city of Weimar. In 1937-1945 over 250,000 people were imprisoned there. Observing the Camp compelled me to pause and reflect. Fortunately we arrived at St Thomas Church in Leipzig in time for evensong by the famous Boys' Choir. It was standing room only! Bach's creativity as choirmaster and organist at the church from 1723-1750 is well known. We also visited "St Nikolaikirche" (St Nicholas Church) which was a central point for peace prayer vigils which started the downfall of the East German regime. Leipzig is a vibrant city with fashionable shops, an Opera House and Concert Hall.

Wittenberg

We travelled from Leipzig to Colditz, a World War II prison camp for captured allied officers. There were many attempts to escape from the camp but few were successful. In Wittenberg we attended an English service on Saturday evening at the "Stadtkirche" where Martin Luther preached. It houses an impres-

sive pipe organ. On the following morning there was a German service at the Schlöss Kirche (Palace Church) where Luther's grave is in front of the pulpit. It is easy to imagine Martin Luther walking the cobbled streets of Wittenberg, and a visit to the Luther Museum revealed much of his domestic and religious life. A renowned artist, Ottmar Hörl, created 800 figures of Martin Luther which are on display in the market square in front of the Town Hall. The exhibit was part of the Luther Decade celebrations commemorating the period between Luther's arrival in Wittenberg in 1508 and the beginning of the Reformation in 1517.

Torgau

We made a short stop at Torgau at the site where American and Russian troops met during the invasion of Germany in April 1945. We could see the castle of King Frederick the Wise. We visited the town church of St Mary's. The construction of this late-Gothic church began in about 1390. Martin Luther's wife, (born Katharina von Bora), died in Torgau in 1552 and is buried in this church. We visited six villages of our ancestors on the way to Bautzen, including Grosspostwitz, Rachlau and Hochkirch (the latter two being connected to my family history). Our accommodation in Bautzen was most welcome after a long day.

Grünberg, Poland

Our tour party was met at the Polish border crossing in Görlitz by our local tour guide. Görlitz is split by a river into a Polish and German side. Silesia was the homeland of a large number of the tour group's ancestors, and we visited five family villages on the way to the city of Zielona Gora (formerly known as Grünberg). In Zielona Gora I visited a large, modern



shopping centre which was in sharp contrast to the village atmosphere of a nearby market. The market featured a variety of stalls as well as performances by groups of young strings players. We also visited Tschicherzig, Klemzig, Langmeil, Züllichau and Bomst.

Wendish homeland

After crossing the border from Poland, we continued visiting the villages of our ancestors, including Jänschwalde and Radeweise. In Radeweise I located the house of my great-grandfather, Christian Nagorcka, thanks to Anne Holzschuh, a local journalist and historian. There is a most comprehensive

and interesting Wendish museum at Jänschwalde, depicting the way of life in that area. Travelling through the Spreewald we took a "kahn fahrt" (boat ride) at Lübbenau along some of the Dutch-made waterways. There are many kilometres of these man-made canals which are popular with locals and tourists alike. The small islands are ideal for relaxing holidays.

- 1. Wimmera, by Homer Rieth. Homer Manfred Rieth, born in Stuttgart, Germany, has made his home in the Wimmera township of Minyip since 1999. His epic poem Wimmera is divided into twelve major books. Each book moves through the experience of a particular place discoveries, establishments, characters, events, settlement and the natural environment.
- St. John's, Kirchheim to Minyip: a brief history of St. John's Lutheran Church, 1874 to 2011. [CD ROM Power Point presentation], compiled and produced by Diane Connolly.
- 3. A short history of St. John's Lutheran Church, Minyip, 1874-1989. [2nd ed.] In 1989, the members of St. John's celebrated 100 years of worship in their present church building, which was moved from its original location at Kirchheim to its present site in Church Street, Minyip, Victoria in 1935.
- 4. History of Bangerang District, 1874-1991. [2nd ed.], compiled by the Bangerang Committee and edited by Ian Maroske. Early settlers in the Parish of Bangerang, east of Warracknabeal, included many families who had emigrated from various Germanic States and Kingdoms: BAUSCH, GREISER, HAUSLER, KELM, KLOBE, KNETSCH, KOSCHITZKE, LIERSCH, MULLER, PIETSCH, SCHULZ, SCHULTZ, VOLLPRECHT.
- 5. A visit to Wendish lands: Eastern Germany and Poland, 2010, by Chris Elmore and Alannah Sheridan. This book is a pictorial record of a visit by the authors to the Wendish areas of Germany and Poland during 2010. It records their experiences in Cottbus and the Spreewald in Germany, and in Sulechow and Klepsk in Poland. (Donated by Chris Elmore.)
- 6. Stog: der Schober 2011: der Heimatkalender aus dem

- Spreewald. [Text in German and Sorbian] A 2011 calendar of events in the Spreewald region.
- 7. The poetry and music of Jan Kilian, by Jan Kilian. Jan Kilian was born in Upper Lusatia in 1811 and died in Serbin, Texas in 1884. Kilian is remembered in Texas as a pastor and leader in the Lutheran community, but he was also a poet and a musician. Based on the 1999 book Jan Kilian, this book was translated from Upper Sorbian into English and published in March 2011 to mark the 200th anniversary of his birth.
- 8. The Lamb enters the Dreaming: Nathanael Pepper & the ruptured world, by Robert Kenny.

 This book explores the conversion to Christianity in 1860 of Nathanael Pepper, (1841-1877), a Wotjubaluk Aboriginal youth, who arrived at the Ebenezer Mission Station in Antwerp, Victoria in 1859.
- The Lutheran Church in Natimuk: 100 years of blessing: historical record published in connection with the centenary of the Lutheran Church in Natimuk, 1972.
 The history of the church through the years of separation to the final amalgamation.
- 10. A forgotten plain revisited: Peppers Plain: a documented history of the Peppers Plain District published on the occasion of the Peppers Plain Community Reunion held on 1 November 2009, researched by Trevor Zanker. This compilation of documents on the early history of Peppers Plain, a locality east of Jeparit, has been produced to mark the occasion of the 2009 Peppers Plain Community Reunion. (Donated by the Peppers Plain District Reunion Committee.)
- 11 100 years of Grace: St. John's Lutheran Church, Bundaberg, Qld., 1877–1977, published in connection with the Centenary Celebrations, 1977.



- 12. The Germans in Western Australia: innovators, immigrants, internees, by Mary Mennicken-Coley. Documents the German presence in Western Australia from 1833 to the present day, and their contributions across a broad spectrum of interests such as art, botany, commerce and farming. Many also experienced the hardships of life as internees during the two World Wars.
- 13. Germans: travellers, settlers and their descendants in South Australia, edited by Peter Monteath. A collection of essays exploring the multiple origins, experiences and contributions of Germans in South Australia over some 175 years.
- 14. The Bradtke family story, 1845-2000 (including the Mann, Schupelius and Weckert families). The family of Alexander Felix Wilhelm Bradtke and his wife Anna Rosina Dorothea Kucke, nee Schlinke... their origins and...a new beginning. This book was published to commemorate the 155th anniversary of the arrival in South Australia of the Bradtke family. (Donated by the Bradtke Family History Committee.)

- 15. "Hopes fulfilled": a history of the Fiegert family in Australia, compiled by Jean Klingberg. This book was published to commemorate the arrival in South Australia of the Fiegert family in 1855.
- 16. Natimuk Lutheran marriages: marriages performed in the Natimuk and District Parish of the Lutheran Church, 1874–1979, compiled by Ian Maroske.
- 17. Nieder-Weiseler in Australien: Church Service & Memorial Dedication: edited English version; Nieder-Wiesel Evangelist Church. 3rd October, 2010. [DVD] In October 2010, 25 Australians with connections to the Ballarat district in Victoria and with ancestral links to Nieder-Weisel, a tiny German village about 40km north of Frankfurt am Main, attended the unveiling of a memorial plaque in Nieder-Weisel. The ceremony commemorated the more than 300 villagers, almost 15% of the village's then population, who left their village in the 1850s–1870s to seek a new life in Australia.

The Oct. 2010 edition includes the Obituary of Mrs Marie Emilie Nitschke (1872-1957). The Dec 2010/Jan 2011 edition refers to the death of Johann Ernest Gersch (born Saxony 1854, died Dimboola 1936, aged 81 years) and gives the Obituary of Mrs Caroline Marie Elizabeth Kraft (1878-1936). The March 2011 edition refers to the death in 1936 of Paul Johannes Pietsch, aged 65 and the marriage in 1936 of Ivy Schwarz of Katyil to Len Gersch of Quantong. This edition also gives the Obituaries of F.M. Reader (born Berlin 1853, chemist of Dimboola, died 1911) and of Carl A. Menzel (born Posen 1837, farmer of Dimboola, died 1911, aged 74). The May 2011 issue includes the Obituary of Johanne Sophia Lisette Koop (1843-1911).
