


March tour 2005 – Bundoora Park's Heritage Village

By noon we had a nice gathering and settled down under the trees and sails just outside the Visitors' Centre. We lunched together and got to know each other. After, we moved to the Ibis Room near the Community Gardens and farm to enjoy a cuppa and hear two talks. Robert Wuchatsch spoke of the early German/Wendish settlers who played a prominent part in the development of the area stretching from Northcote and Preston up to Westgarthtown (Thomastown). One prominent settler, a Wend by the name of Henry Zwar, was also known as the 'King of Preston'. As a local business man and landowner, he took a leading role in the community, serving as Councillor and Mayor, promoting the arts and many forms of sport, and being an active church member.

Surnames of other early settlers of German or Wendish ancestry in the Northcote area were Arndt, Gursanscky, Hellwig, Kupsch, Muller, Fritsch, Schosnick and Tillack.

Long time local resident, Merv Lia, an expert in local history, enlightened us on the history of Bundoora Park. He explained that Bundoora is an aboriginal name meaning Favourite Place of Kangaroos. Samuel Gardiner acquired the land in 1877 and established a cattle and race horse stud around what is known as Mt Cooper, the highest spot in metropolitan Melbourne. In those days, it was called Cooper's Settlement. The park now covers 180 hectares and features an urban farm, golf course, heritage village, wildlife park, picnic areas, a Visitors' Centre and Café, and the historic village known as Cooper's Settlement. To our delight, we were taken there in a trailer drawn by a tractor, after which Merv led us on a tour of the horse stud buildings, chapel, farrier's shop, the graves of champion racehorses, machinery shed, and manager's house. Some visited nearby beautiful, historic Bundoora Homestead. It was built in 1899 by John Matthew Vincent Smith and is now open to the public as an Arts Centre.

Our day concluded with a relaxing meal and chat at the Austrian Club in West Heidelberg.

Next day we gathered in Westgarthtown, founded by a group of Wendish families from Prussia who developed a farming community here. Meeting at the restored heritage Ziebell's Cottage, we took a walk through the cottage and marvelled at the lovingly restored garden. The nearby pioneer cemetery reminded us of the original settlers and their heritage. A short walk brought us to the historic bluestone Lutheran Church for the Sunday service. After lunch we made our way to the historic Northcote Cemetery, where gravestones include those surnames listed above. This concluded an interesting weekend of history and of remembering what a rich heritage our forbears left for us to enjoy.

Geoff has been a keen family history researcher since the 1970s when he wrote the Biar family history. He was pleased to meet George Nielsen at the time and to share information with him about the Biar family who migrated both to Texas and to Australia.

Wendish Fest Tour to Texas: September 2006



Enis and Geoff Saegenschnitter (left) from Greenock S.A. will lead a twelve day tour to the U.S.A. primarily to attend the annual Wendish Fest in Serbin, Texas on Sunday 24 September 2006.

In 2004, the Saegenschnitters attended the Texas Wendish Heritage Society's annual picnic day, which attracted over 2,500 people and included international guests from Germany, a Wendish dance group from Cottbus, a German brass ensemble and a pastor from Germany. A demonstration of egg painting was a feature.

The 2006 proposed tour will include an inspection of the Wendish Heritage Museum, church and other Wendish heritage sites in Serbin and Texas, as well as other major tourist attractions in Texas and in California.

The tour aims to forge closer ties between the Wendish Heritage Societies in Serbin, Texas and in Melbourne and Adelaide, and to enable participants to share in a common heritage. There are many Wendish surnames which are common to both Texas and Australia.

Enis and Geoff have been to Serbin on four occasions and have led three previous overseas group tours. Geoff has been a member of the Texas Wendish Heritage Society since the 1970s.

At the end of this tour, an optional five day extension is being offered to go to tourist attractions such as Disneyland and other locations in Los Angeles, Tijuana in Mexico, Las Vegas, Hoover Dam and the Grand Canyon. J.C.A. Kruger Pipe Organs

Johann Carl August Kruger was born at Cottbus, Brandenburg, Prussia, on 11 January 1802. He was known as Carl, hereafter referred to as JCA. In 1840, at Cottbus, he was married to Maria Duch who was born at Leuthen on 6 April 1805.

Kruger is a German word meaning "Inn keeper". Duch, which is also Wendish, means "Spirit". JCA and Maria were blessed with four children, all born at Cottbus. The family moved to Przewoz (Priebus), now in Poland, where JCA was employed as an organ builder and organist. For religious and economic reasons, they, together with many other Wendish families, decided to emigrate to Australia. They sailed from Hamburg on the ship *Victoria* and arrived in Port Adelaide on 6 November 1848.

The family settled in the Lyndoch Valley at Hoffnungsthal, where JCA was in the company of other skilled tradesmen such as carpenters, joiners, masons, boot makers and tailors.

In 1850, while at Hoffnungsthal, JCA built a pipe organ for St. Jacobi Lutheran Church. The construction of the organ is unique. The casework is the frame and all mortises, cornices and dovetailing are impeccable. After 130 years of service, the windchest is still in "as new" condition. Its wooden pipes are yellow pine, the blocks are jarrah and the stoppers are Australian red cedar. Its metal pipes, of Continental style, are possibly the first manufactured in the colony of South Australia. In 1928 it was moved from the Bethany Lutheran Church to St. Thomas Lutheran Church Stockwell, where it is still in use.

After 154 years, the organ is in immaculate condition and is in demand for recitals by local and international organists. It was used for recital at the Centenary of the church building on 7-8 August 2004.

After heavy floods at Hoffnungsthal in 1853, JCA moved to Tarrington (then Hochkirch),Vic. where he was naturalised in 1857 and took up farming. In 1863 St. Michael's Lutheran Church engaged him to build a pipe organ and this was in use until 1928. It is now in the Tanunda Museum. A third organ may have been built and further information about this is welcome.

JCA Kruger died on 24 October 1871 and his wife Maria died on 23 July 1877. Both were buried in the Tabor Lutheran Cemetery.

The Moravian Brethren at Bethel in South Australia

The article on the Moravian Brethren on pg 6 of our Newsletter No. 33 indicated this group traced back to John Hus, an early Protestant Reformer who was burned to death in 1415. Lutherans, named after Dr Martin Luther (1483-1546) and these Brethren therefore have had much in common.

The Bethel settlement near Kapunda is a good example of Brethren who developed a Herrnhutstyle commune but who in the early 1900s joined the Lutheran Church.

A detailed and interesting ten-page account of the rise and decline of the Bethel Commune is under the heading "Bethel Australia Mission", and can be located through a search on the Google search-engine.

The author is unknown but, it seems most of the information was supplied by Frieda Schmidt, daughter of Rudolph Schmidt, a participant in the Commune.

Some Moravian Brethren who came to South Australia in 1848 settled at Light's Pass but when Pastor Christoph S. D. Schondorf (1814-1898) arrived in 1854 from Germany and served Light's Pass, he sought and chose land near Kapunda for the settlement which he called "Bethel".

The settlers cleared their land and built their homes, church and Band Hall. They continued their clothing customs such as unmarried girls wearing some pink and married women wearing some rich red.

Some Wendish families also involved themselves in the community when in 1856 Peter and George Doecke took up land at Bethel and established the "Steinthal" church. Naturally, there was intermarriage between the two groups.

By the 1870s Pastor Schondorf was becoming old so Pastor Anton Jacobi (1841-91) came to serve them from 1876. When he died in 1891, Pastor Paul Buck was sent from Germany in 1892. However rifts occurred between members and in 1906, he was recalled to Germany. The members then sought a Lutheran Pastor, Pastor Bemman (1866-1934).

South Australian Headstones now on our Society's Computer.

Robert Phillis who lives at 30 Ward Street Eudunda SA has carefully photographed and indexed over 4,500 headstones located in 46 cemeteries in South Australia. He has made these available to our Society and they are now on our Society's computer. Such headstones naturally indicate where early germanic and wendish settlers established themselves and were buried.

News from Germany:

Crows explode toads

Readers of German and Wendish folk-lore are used to such characters as black crows and ugly toads. There are even toads who turn into handsome princes. However, readers of the Age dated Sat 30 April 2005 were informed about hundreds of exploding toads in Germany, including some no doubt in Lusatia. Veterinary surgeon Frank Mutschmann has concluded that when crows peck at a toad in order to get at its liver, the toad swells up in self-defence, has its stomach punctured and its blood vessels explode. He concludes that "crows are intelligent animals". Perhaps we are only now finding out what our ancestors already knew about these clever creatures of nature!

Sorbian schools facing closure

Robert Brytan has informed us by email on 27 June 2005 that following the closure of the Sorbian primary school at Crostwitz in Lusatia, there are now plans to close the schools in Panschwitz Kuchau and Radibor. The organization "TheYouth of European Nationalities" recently participated in the recent demonstration against these closures. Judith Walde, a board member of YEN, stated that "for us Sorbs, our schools are also our lifeblood." Their press release stresses that the preservation of the Sorbian people, their language, culture and identity in Lusatia need an intact network of schools.

Other societies

The following are summaries of items of interest from other societies' journals:

German settlers in Queensland

The May 2004 edition of *Die Zeitung (newsletter of the German Research Group, Genealogical Society of Qld.)* gives these tips on seeking the origins of German settlers in Qld.:

- German ships came to Qld. from 1855 to 1879.
- German migration to Qld. was suspended between 1866 and 1870.
- Passenger lists for the *Diana* (1858) and the *Solon* (1859) have been lost.
- At other times Germans came to Qld. from other Australian colonies or states, by land or coastal vessels, or from overseas from non-German ports, eg. the U.K.

The March 2005 edition of *Die Zeitung* has an article on Germans in Qld. originating from the first free settlers at Zion Hill, Nundah.

"Inducements and agents: German, Northern European and Scandinavian recruitment to Tasmania, 1855-1887" by Marita Hargraves.

The October 2004 edition of the *International Settlers Group Newsletter* features a review of this book. The reviewer, Margaret Brughera, describes the book as a thorough, well organized and readable account of Tasmanian immigration. Of particular interest is Chapter 1, "Willkommen in Tasmanien" of 75 pages, including document facsimiles such as an emigrant handbook in English and a recruitment pamphlet in German, both written by the agent Frederick Buck. This chapter also gives interesting details about the artist Ludwig Becker, and the botanist Ferdinand Mueller (later Baron Von Mueller) and others.

Herrnhut and the archaelogical dig

Herrnhut Commune was established by Germans near Penshurst in 1853 under the leadership of Johann Friedrich Krumnow. *The Hamilton History Centre Inc. Newsletter* of Feb. 2005 gives details of an archaelogical dig that took place at the site in January 2005.

Migration of the Lieschke family

The February 2005 edition of *Murrumbidgee Ancestor* features an article by Lois Lieschke describing ship-

board condition for passengers on the *Helene*. This ship left Hamburg bound for S.A. on 5th Sept. 1851. On board were a group of migrants from Lusatia, including members of the Lieschke family.

Darragh Index to the Melbourne German Sick and Relief Society Membership 1861-1924: Melbourner Deutscher Krankenverein.

This Society was founded in 1861 with the aim to provide sickness and death benefits to members and to support members who were needy or out of work. The Society also had a welfare fund from which payments were made to needy Germans who were not members.

Dr Tom Darragh has translated the Society's documents and compiled an alphabetical index of members. Biographical data is also given. Of particular value in the records are the dates and places of birth in Germany of the members, making the Index of great value to genealogists.

August Gottlieb Lehmann (1861-1947)

The 1947 obituary and tribute to A. G. Lehmann are reprinted in *The Dimboola & District Historical Society Inc. Newsletter*, March 2005. He was born at Tarrington, Vic., and lived most of his life in the Dimboola district where he was a school teacher, store manager and bookseller. In 1884 he married Ernestine Milich of Jeparit, and they had a family of twelve children.

Land settlement in South Australia

A brief overview of land settlement in S.A. appeared in *South East Family History Group's Newsletter* (Millicent S.A. Vol. 25 No. 1, Feb 2005, p 13). Lucy Thompson surveys land development for agricultural use over the period 1836 – 1890 and shows that it was rapid and was a very significant proportion of land was used for agriculture Australia wide. By 1860, it was 31% and by 1880, it was 46%. We have a copy of this in our library.
