## Visitors from Lusatia

Heiko Kosel and Anna Kossatz visited our Wendish Research Centre at Ivanhoe on Tuesday 27 December 2005. They were on a holiday in Australia and visited Hahndorf, the Barossa Valley and Yorke Peninsula in South Australia, the Westgarthtown/ Thomastown settlement and Immigration Museum in Melbourne and Anna's Kossatz relatives.

They informed us about their lives in Lusatia and raised issues relating to the Sorbs/Wends which are of concern.
Heiko is a lawyer and a member of the Parliament of Saxony. He is responsible for Bautzen and district and some issues which have arisen include the Parliament's desire to close more Sorbian schools, the destruction of villages near Schleife for coal mining, the clarification of Saxon laws relating to the Sorbs and the damaging of the bi-lingual street and town signs. Heiko also meets with members of the Brandenburg Parliament who represent the Cottbus area.
In regard to wendish migration to Australia in the 1850s and 1860s, Heiko is interested to find out the reasons why families left Lusatia and what the conditions were like for these pioneers here in Australia. There was certainly more land available in Australia for the sons but clearing the land and building homes was hard work.
Looking into the future, Heiko was pleased with the work being done by the Sorbian Youth Society and the Domowina and he noted the influence of the literature produced by Alfons Frencl and Trudla Mahling. He suggested more effort to maintain the Sorbian schools, the possibility of exchange students and an art display.Heiko's email is Heiko@Koselec.de
Anna Kossatz lives in Cottbus where she is involved in Wendish/Sorbian issues. She helps in translation work at the Tourist Office and Courts, she organises celebrations, does liaison work between the Cottbus Town Council and the Domowina in Bautzen and she helps the Mayor.

## Obituary:

## Professor Richard Dalitz

Professor Richard (Dick), Henry Dalitz died on 13 January 2006 aged 80, after suffering from a stroke. He was born on 28 February 1925 at Dimboola and, after gaining a degree in Mathematics and Physics at Melbourne University, he went to Britain in 1946 to do a PhD . He later held positions in New York and Chicago and in 1966 he became Research Professor at Oxford University, where he retired in 1990. He made the name Dalitz a byword in high energy physics.

His wendish Dalitz ancestors left Werben in Lusatia for Australia in 1858 and he visited East Germany in the 1970 s in order to locate his family's early records. He prepared a biography of the Wendish poet Mato Kosyk and conducted early research into the ship Pribislaw, which brought about fifty Wendish emigrants to Australia in 1850.

On a visit to Australia in 1978, Professor Dalitz did some research on the Pribislaw's passengers, mainly at the National Australian Archives in Canberra, where he studied the Victorian naturalization records. He provided this information to Robert Wuchatsch during that trip and helped Robert greatly over the next ten years to further research the Pribislaw and its passengers. In regard to his Pribislaw input, in the late 1980s, Dick found a German article on the Pribislaw which said it was wrecked in the Shetlands in 1870.

In 2002, Robert and wife Gaye went there looking for photos of the wreck of the Pribislaw and discovered it had a whole new life off the sea.

An obituary by Frank Close was printed in The Guardian on 24 Jan 2006 and this was reprinted in The Age, Wed 8 Feb 2006.

We extend our thoughts and sympathy to his family.

## The Moravian Brethren at Bethel in South Australia (continued from last Newsletter)

...The author then points out that some of the Moravian Brethren were growing tired of financially supporting those commune members less fortunate or industrious. They also felt that the preaching of the new Lutheran pastor was going over their heads.

At about this time, over in Ireland several evangelists named William Irvine and Edward Cooney were holding evangelical Christian meetings in halls, tents and homes, seeking converts and then sending them out around the world in pairs as "tramp preachers". They claimed to trace their ideas back to the ministry of Jesus and took literally the instructions in Matthew 10 to preach, heal and cast out demons. They claimed that the established churches based their beliefs on later false creeds and confessions and that the followers of William Irvine alone could claim the Truth, since they alone were authorized by Jesus to preach the Gospel. Naturally, this claim created considerable friction with the established churches, including the Lutheran.

Two such "tramp preachers" called Sam Jones from Ireland and Jim Murray from New Zealand visited Bethel. They had followed the railway line south from Gladstone and at Stockport, they heard from a former Commune member Martha Matz about the discontent at Bethel.They met Hermann Geue while he was raking up hay and they sought a building for a gospel meeting. Since Rudolph Schmidt would not give his permission for them to use the Band Hall and the Pastor refused them the use of the Church, they held gospel meetings in the home of Hermann and Lydia Geue. Soon, families such as the Doeckes, Linkes, Schmidts and Vogts also joined in, with some attending conventions and seeking adult baptism in the nearby River Gilbert. After a convention held on Wuttke's farm at Woodside, Sam Jones returned to Bethel with a new companion, Jimmy Valance from New Zealand and with one of the founders of this "church without a name", William Irvine. The author notes that some followers "sensed there was something amiss with brother Irvine". Part of it may have been his confidence that the world would end in the next couple of years! What did end was the Bethel Commune as a Moravian mission in June 1910, when some members
joined a branch of the Lutheran Church while others joined in preaching and professing Christianity around the world as Cooneyites or Two By Twos in the tradition of William Irvine and Edward Cooney. Descendants of these Bethel ancestors may therefore obtain more family information and background in either Australian Lutheran history books or by conducting a computer Google search on the "Bethel Australia Mission" and on the "Two by Twos" founded by Irvine and Cooney.

Our Library contains a dozen obituaries of Bethel residents compiled by Christoph and Woldemar Schondorf between 1883 and 1898 and translated by H.F.W. Proeve in 1988. David Simmons has drawn up a plan of the Old Moravian Cemetery. These include members of the John, Kornetzky, Kubasch, Lindner, Schondorf and Seekamp families. Christoph's obituary reveals that the Brethren constituted themselves in Bethel with him as their pastor on 1 March 1857, the date of the 400th anniversary of the foundation of the United (later Moravian) Brethren in 1457. Christoph became deaf as he aged and he died on 22 Feb 1898, aged 83 years.

## Missionary to the Kaurna: the Klose letters

This fascinating book contains some of the letters of the earliest German Lutheran missionaries to come to South Australia. It is published by Friends of Lutheran Archives.

Samuel Gottlieb Klose, born 1802 in Loewenberg, Silesia, was an early German Lutheran missionary sent to work among the Aboriginal people in S.A. Klose reported regularly to his senders, the Dresden Missionary Society. Letters covering the first 5 years of his service in and around Adelaide, written in old gothic script but now translated into English, reveal the amazing faith and courage he and his colleagues displayed in reaching out to the Kaurna people with the Good News of Jesus our Saviour.

His earliest letters tell of his call to S.A., the obstacles he had to deal with to reach our shores and begin his work, and how he coped at the very beginning of white settlement in this foreign land. An amazing story of dedication and caring, the more so when you remember that he and his fellow missionaries were Germans struggling to master English and at the same time befriending the local native people and learning to speak their language.
