Grovedale/Germantown pioneers commemorated, 10 September 2006

The early pioneer families of *Germantown* (now Grovedale, Victoria) were commemorated with the unveiling of a Memorial Stone at the Germantown Cemetery on 10 Sept. 2006. Local historian June Winter has researched the early German families, many of whom were buried in this cemetery.

The first group who settled included the families Bieske, Baensch, Winter and Kerger. They arrived on the ship *Emmy* in 1849 and were subsidised by Dr Alexander Thomson because they were needed to work as vine-dressers. Each family was offered a block of about one acre near the Waurn Chain of Ponds Creek.

Other early settler families included on the memorial were Andresson, Rossack, Kosseck, Hartwich, Pacholke, Renzow, Heyer, Schultz, Baum, Momm, Jasper, Lorke, Schneider, Hermann and Klemke.

Most were Lutherans who built their church with walls of mud and a roof of thatched grass. This was also their school where the first teacher, Mr Stranger, taught from 1854 to 1858. Pastor Matthias Goethe conducted the first church service on 24 June 1854. By 1859 two congregations, Trinity and St Paul's, emerged, with the early records being stored in the

Trinity manse. When this manse burnt down in 1893, the early records were lost.

In 1875, the disease "phylloxera" destroyed the vines. The vineyards were replaced by orchards and market gardens, which dominated the area for over one hundred years.

Closure of Zion/Neukirch Lutheran Church, Byaduk, Sunday 17 Sept 2006

The Byaduk area, south of Hamilton in Victoria, was first settled by Johann Rentsch, who purchased land there in August 1860. By 1865, other families, who were mostly Wends from Lusatia in Brandenburg and Saxony, purchased land there as well. They included Johann GUDE, Johann SCHLEMMER, Matthes HANDRECK, Martin KOSCH, Johann HONA, Christian BRAMKE, Johann SALZKE, Martin KOTZUR, Mathes JEITZ, Johann KILO, Martin PUMPA, Martin TOWK, Adolph PERTZEL and Christian NICKEL.

In 1866, these families formed the Neukirch congregation and a wattle and daub church was erected. Pastor C.W. Schurmann conducted services there. A weatherboard church was erected in 1886, but after this was destroyed in a bush fire in 1900, the present brick church was erected in 1902. The congregation flourished in the 1960s and 1970s but by 18 Jan 2006, the few remaining members decided to cease operating. The closure was held on Sunday 17 Sep 2006 but the Cemetery will continue to be used.

Descendants of Johann Rentsch, Ossie and Elaine Rentsch, still occupy the original land selected in 1860.

Annual Dinner: The Deutscher Family, 7 October 2006

The Society's Annual Dinner was held in the Community Centre at Calvary Lutheran Church, Greensborough. The Dinner celebrated the 20th Anniversary of our Society.

Guest speakers, Chris Deutscher of *Deutscher-Menzies Fine Art Auctioneers and Valuers*, and Daryl Deutscher of *Deutscher's Turkey Farm* at Dadswells Bridge, Victoria spoke of the Deutscher family's arrival on the *Alfred* in 1848 and settlement in Australia. They referred the audience to the Deutscher family history book which contains much valuable information. They even had a few spare copies for distribution.

The speakers did not anticipate that there would be a power blackout for most of the evening! Their presentations, with the aid of torches and from memory, were much appreciated.

Kevin Zwar, our President gave a special tribute to Pastor Siegfried Albert, Lutheran Pastor at Groeditz, who, in his spare time translated many articles from Wendish into German, including the 1848 petition from Wendish farmers to the King of Saxony requesting better treatment of the Wends. His translations have made an excellent contribution to our knowledge of Wendish issues.

Peters Hill Church 150th Anniversary, 15 October 2006

Peters Hill consisted mostly of Wendish settlers from Lower Lusatia when the St Peters congregation was formed in 1856. The first service was held in the home of Johann Noack, which was built of stone with a thatched roof. Pastor H.A. E. Meyer, the pastor at Bethany, conducted occasional services at Peters Hill.

On 15 October, 2006, this early period of history was recalled when Pastor James Winderlich, a descendant of Johann Noack, came to the church on a german wagon drawn by two draught horses. The church, which had been carefully renovated by the Friends of Peters Hill Church, was full and the congregation was amused when Pastor James climbed up into the pulpit high above the altar and then asked the congregation whether they could see him. He spoke of the faith displayed by the biblical Hebrews as they migrated from Sumer to Palestine, then down to Egypt and eventually through the wilderness to their Promised Land of Canaan, the land flowing with milk and honey. He compared this to the faith displayed by the germanic and wendish immigrants who sailed for about three months from Hamburg to Australia, their Promised Land and soon built their school and church upon arriving at Peters Hill.

A community lunch under the gum trees was followed by a visit to the site of the first church service in Johann Noack's home in 1856 and a visit to the Pioneer Cemetery, which now has a detailed map on the site showing the names of those buried and the locations of their graves.

The Friends of Peters Hill have worked very hard to preserve the church and cemeteries and their Newsletter always lists pioneering families, including the Wends from Lusatia, who settled in this district in the mid-1800s. Some early Wendish families here included Bartusch, Borrack, Domaschenz, Dreckow, Duldig, Fladrich, Gormann, Gassan, Groch, Hondow, Huppatz, Jarick, Kschenka, Krueger, Lehmann, Marschall (Marscha), Miatke, Noack, Petatz, Proposch, Pumpa, Schuppan, Schwartz, Starick, Teschner, Zoellner and Zerner. Few of these families remain there now, although the Huppatz and Zerner



families still call it home or still have farms there. James Huppatz also cares for the original Huppatz home, which is incorporated into his present house.

Considering the crowd attending, it is clear that many descendants enjoy returning to Peters Hill, which their ancestors may well have viewed as their very own Garden of Eden.

The September 2006 edition of the *Newsletter of the Friends of Peters Hill Church Inc* includes a brief biography of Pastor Heinrich Eduard MEYER (1813-1862), some notes on the family of Christian and Maria FLADRICH by Brian Hennig and a letter by Matthes SCHWARTZ, sent to Germany in 1864 and submitted by David Simmons. Matthes comments that "the people here are 20 times better off than in Germany" but in regard to mail, he wrote "I wanted to send you money but I heard that the letters do not get there".

Thomastown/Westgarthtown 150th Anniversary, 12 Nov 2006

The Thomastown Lutheran Congregation celebrated the 150th anniversary of the dedication of its church building, which took place on 17 November 1856. The only older Lutheran Church building is at Lobethal in South Australia.

A Celebration Dinner was held on Friday 10 November at Calvary, Greensborough. Herbert Mees, Pastor Stephen Pietsch and Robert Wuchatsch talked on the history of the church and the relationship of Thomastown with the Trinity Lutheran Church East Melbourne and the Greensborough congregation respectively.

Most of the pioneering families arrived in 1849 on the ships *Godeffroy*, *Wappaus*, *Dockenhuden* and *Emmy* and in 1850 on the *Pribislaw* and *Alfred*. William Westgarth assisted the pioneers during settlement and the 16 original land purchasers included Franke, Graff, Groening, Gruenberg, Heyne, Kawerau, Knobloch, Maltzahn, Siebel, Timm, Waehner, Wanke, Winter, Wuchatsch, Ziebell and Zimmer.

Services were conducted in English after about 1930. In 1935, the choice was made to remain affiliated with Trinity in East Melbourne after this church joined the German Protestant Church Federation and was required to depart from the United Evangelical Lutheran Church of Australia (the UELCA).

The post-war intake of refugees from Germany

led to a re-introduction of services in German. In 1985, Thomastown affiliated with the Calvary congregation at Greensborough.

Pastors Brett Kennett and Joachim von Mitzlaff were liturgists and Pastor Greg Pietsch's sermon raised issues relating to the congregation's heritage in relation to their daily living and their faith.

A tasty afternoon tea at Ziebell's Farmhouse concluded an enriching weekend.

Family History Expo at Mulwala, 18 November 2006

Freshwater Creek/Waldkirch: 140th anniversary of the laying of the foundation stone, 19 November 2006

As early as 1849, Dr Alexander Thomson, one of the founders of Geelong, was instrumental in bringing a number of German families to the Geelong area. They first established vineyards and market gardens at Germantown, now Grovedale, and gradually other settlements followed. By 1859, a community at Freshwater Creek, south-west of Geelong was well established. Some early German pioneers of Freshwater Creek include Johann Seiffert, Johann Schmidt, Johann Einsporn, Johann Leibhardt and Karl Rau.

St. David's Lutheran Church and Cemetery (originally "Waldkirch") was the community centre and final resting-place of most of the pioneer families of Freshwater Creek. In November 2006, a service was held to celebrate the 140th anniversary of the laying of the foundation stone of the present bluestone building, on 15 April 1866.

St. David's Lutheran Church and Cemetery are listed on the Heritage Register and on the National Trust, for their links to the earliest German settlers in the Geelong region. We thank Gladys Knight for giving us this information on the history of Freshwater Creek.

Annual Dinner – The 1857 Ships: Saturday 6 October 2007

Our Society's Annual Dinner, 6.00pm for 7.00pm, Saturday 6 October 2007, at the Ringwood Lutheran Hall, will give descendants of the passengers of the 1857 ships an opportunity to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the arrival in Melbourne of about ten ships, carrying passengers from Hamburg.

The lists of passengers from Hamburg were transcribed from hand-written originals during the 1980s and 1990s by volunteers under the supervision of the Public Record Office. Many of the germanic

and wendish surnames were transcribed incorrectly so we would like to hear from you if you can pass on the correct spelling, or provide additional information about the ships and their passengers, which we can add to our shipping and surname files.

The following list of passengers is available from two sources: the CD ROM "Immigration and Shipping Lists: Unassisted Shipping Index 1851-1923" and the index "Unassisted Immigration to Victoria: Index of inward Passenger Lists for British, Foreign and New Zealand Ports, 1852-1923" on the website:

The suggested alternative, given below after the forward slash, has been taken from the CD "Emigrants from Hamburg to Australia 1850-1879" compiled by Eric and Rosemary Kopittke, available for use in our Library. These are based on departure lists with better spelling of surnames and include the 1857 ships Carl, Dorothea, Gottingen, Sverge and Hermann. The information in brackets is the suggestion of John Noack who, in the 1980s, identified and inspected the passenger lists of over 100 ships carrying Germans and Wends, which sailed from Hamburg to Melbourne in the 1850s.

In the following lists are large family groups, but the SURNAME in capitals is listed only once, and only includes the eldest male or female. If any of these pioneers are your ancestors, we look forward to hearing from you.

German internees at Berrima Gaol

The *International Settlers Group Newsletter* of Oct. 2006 lists the names of Germans interned at Berrima Gaol in N.S.W. during the First World War. The names are listed alphabetically, and are taken from the book *Prisoners in Arcady* by John Simons.

German internees at Holsworthy

The Nov. 2006 issue of *Links "n" chains: journal of the Liverpool Genealogy Society Inc.* has an article about Germans interned in the prisoner-of-war camp at Holsworthy, N.S.W. during the First World War.

Conrad Heinz (1846-1896), Mayor of Bendigo The Nov. 2006 edition of the German Heritage Society Inc. Newsletter gives a biography of a notable German, Conrad Heinz, who served as a Bendigo councillor in 1891-96, and Mayor in 1894-95. He was a very enterprising and successful businessman and the only person of German origin to be elected to the position of Mayor.

Ernst Bernhardt Heyne (1825-1881) by Robert Wuchatsch

The Friends of Westgarthtown News of Nov. 2006 features an article on a notable Westgarthtown pioneer, Ernst Bernhardt Heyne. Heyne, a trained botanist, was a landholder and a teacher at Westgarthtown for a short time. He then found employment at Melbourne's Botanical Gardens from 1856–1869, first as a plantsman and then as secretary to Ferdinand Mueller. In 1869, Heyne moved to Adelaide. He was a prolific and highly successful author on horticultural topics.

Recent Library Acquisitions

Emigrants from Hamburg to Australasia 1850-1879 [CD] published by the Queensland Family History Society, 2006

This CD is a searchable index to and a listing of passengers on the available passenger lists for ships from Hamburg to Australia and NZ between 1850 and 1879, compiled by Rosemary and Eric Kopittke. It records the name, former place of residence, age, occupation, ship, destination and departure year for more than 40,000 emigrants. This CD is a wonderful resource for Australians and New Zealanders with German ancestry. Applying for a passport

We are indebted to Ursula B. Adamson in Michigan for the following information on the waiting period for someone intending to emigrate from a German territory to the US once they had applied for a passport in the 1800's.

The general rule was that anyone wanting to emigrate had to apply for a passport at the local level. The prospective emigrant had to swear an oath, stating that he had fulfilled his military obligations, that he did not owe any money to anyone, that he did not leave behind dependents, who upon his leaving would have to be supported by the village, etc.

In the 1830's and 1840's his intention to leave would then be published in the local newspaper. In later years, when the number of emigrants for a given place reached into the hundreds, publication in the local newspaper consisted of lists of prospective emigrants.

Typically, a newspaper announcement would read something like this:

Mr. Heinrich Schuhmann of Anywhere, Germany is intending to emigrate to America. Anyone having a claim against the emigrant should contact this office no later than 3 months from the date of this publication otherwise the emigrant will be granted permission to leave.

At the end of the 3 month waiting period, the prospective emigrant would be issued a passport, giving the full name and age of the emigrant, his wife and children. Once the emigrant was issued his 'walking papers' he was officially released from the feudalism and was considered no longer a citizen or subject of the ruling king or potentate.

This also had serious consequences, namely that once the emigrant had obtained his release, he was then a 'person without a country'. This was one of the reasons why so many emigrated secretly. They wanted to be sure that if they didn't like it in America, they had a home to which they could return.
