About 12 of these families migrated to Australia aboard the *Victoria* in 1858.



# Past events

Visit to Tarrington's Nagorcka Sites, 8-9 March 2008.

Our Wendish Heritage Society and the descendants of Christian and Emilie Nagorcka (who had twelve children) celebrated the 150th Anniversary of the arrival of the Nagorcka ancestors in Australia in 1857 on the ship *Gottorp*.

A program from 12 noon Saturday to 5pm Sunday was very well organised by our Treasurer Clay Kruger and Local Historian Betty Huf.

A local reporter Brian O'Brien wrote an illustrated article which described very well both this celebration and the contribution of the Nagorcka family to the District. It was published in the Saturday Magazine of the local *Hamilton Spectator* titled "A huge impact on Hamilton region". He noted that in Europe, Christian had been a groom in the stables of the Prussian King Friedrich Wilhelm III and that nearly all of the early settlers in the Tarrington and Hamilton district were Slavic Wends from Lusatia south-east of Berlin. These included the Burger, Deutscher, Handreck, Harnath, Kosch, Krause,

Kruger, Lehmann, Matuschka, Mirtschin, Pertzel, Petschel, Rentsch, Salzke, Schmidt, Starick, Voight and Urban families.

Following Saturday's midday lunch, we visited five Nagorcka family sites and locations: Kitset Kitchens, Waltanna, Ovalbank formerly Peitz, Hochkirch Winery and the Tarrington Homestead.

Betty Huf prepared detailed notes and a map of the sites which we inspected on Saturday afternoon. Her detailed notes are on our Wendish website.

1) The Kitset Kitchens factory is located at 35 Baimbridge Road in Hamilton. Prior to Kitset and back in 1946, Stanley Nagorcka opened a joinery called "Nagorcka and Yuille", which produced windows, doors and cabinets for the district. In 1992, Stan's children, Mark and Mary Ann specialised in flat-pack, self-assembly kitchens, which are measured and cut according to the instructions from their computer. Kitset Kitchens at present has

- showrooms in Ballarat, Thornbury and Moorabbin and has orders from all over Australia.
- 2) Waltanna on the Glenelg Highway at Warrayure is the home of "Waltanna Tractors". In 1975, James Nagorcka built his first four-wheel drive tractor and he went on to produce 175 in this series. For several years after 1985, he joined with Ford to produce 45 articulated tractors. After 1989, James specialised in rubber-tracked tractors, which are suitable for forestry work and oil exploration. In 2007, the family launched the "Waltanna Gold" brand of organic oils, produced from a variety of flaxseed grown on the farm.
- 3) Ovalbank is located on Nagorcka Road in Tarrington and is the property purchased by Christian on 23 November 1865. He called it Peitz, after the town in Lusatia, Prussia near where he was born, but the name was probably changed to Ovalbank during World War I. Christian and Emilie raised their twelve children there and used the cellar, which is still standing, for storing their food. The family sold this property in 2007.
- 4) The Hochkirch Winery is located at Croxton Park on the Hamilton Highway at Tarrington. The farm was bought by John's grandfather Christian in 1909 and it is now owned by John and Jenny Nagorcka, who live close-by in their award-winning and impressive Gothic-revival style homestead.

Their whole farm including the vineyard is a certified biodynamic property. They began Cellar Door sales in 2003 and have produced Riesling, Semillon, Cabernet Sauvignon, Pinot Noir and Shiraz.

Nearby, John's sister Dianne produces wine under the "Tarrington Vineyard" label.

No doubt the Vigneron Nagorckas agree with Dr Martin Luther's motto for a happy life. Apart from saying: "Hier stehe Ich" ("Here I Stand") or at meal times probably: "Hier sitze Ich" ("Here I Sit"), Dr Luther is supposed to have famously said, "Er hat kein Wein, Weib und Sang, Lebt ein Narr sein Leben lang" ("Who has no wine, women or song, lives a fool his whole life long").



5) The Tarrington Homestead is located on Picnic Road at Tarrington. It was bought by Stephen Henty back in the 1860s and he named it after his home village in Sussex, England called "Tarring". The home was leased by Arthur Nagorcka in 1912 and purchased by him in 1923. This Nagorcka branch of the family still owns it. The home's second storey and iron-lace decoration

The home's second storey and iron-lace decoration creates a most impressive sight in the Tarrington country landscape.

Our guest speakers after our evening meal were Betty Huf, who described the early settlement in the district by the Wendish families mentioned above and Jeff and Wayne Nagorcka who described their visit to Germany and Lusatia in 2006, including their ancestral home, Peitz.

During the Thanksgiving service on Sunday, Pastor Zwar pointed to the faith, loyalty and contributions of the district's early settlers, including the Wends. Members of the Wendish Heritage Society read the lessons and played the pipe organ.

After a delicious community lunch, Betty Huf conducted a tour of the South Hamilton Cemetery and donated a copy of a script to our Library. The script will also be included on our website.

An interesting feature was the display of Nagorcka family memorabilia in the Tarrington Hall.

Those who planned the weekend – meals, tours of inspection, talks and church service – can be sure that those who attended fully appreciated their work and we extend our sincere gratitude.

# The Wends and the Nieder-Weisel Folk in Victoria

The Nieder-Weisel people came from the same village in Hesse, a German State, and over 300 emigrated to Victoria. Most knew each other and many families were inter-related. About a third of them returned to Nieder-Weisel, some after striking it rich and, some when tragedy took their loved ones. There was a strong connection to return to home. The Wends came from a large area of numerous villages, with some in Prussia and the others in the Kingdom of Saxony and many Wends were complete strangers to each other. A few returned home but not as many as the Nieder-Weisel people. A few from each group went on to America.

The Nieder-Weisel people were fluent in German. Some travelled to England in desperation to find work. After years in England many left when news came of great gold discoveries around the world – in California, New South Wales, and Victoria. Some Nieder-Weisel people therefore spoke English.

The Wends were fluent in their Wendish language and a number spoke German but, hardly any spoke English before arriving in Australia. The Wends tended to catch the train to Hamburg and then a German ship to Australia. Some went to South Australia and later trekked inland to Victoria and New South Wales.

The Wends settled in the Western part of Victoria, around Hamilton and Horsham, and some around Melbourne.

Almost without exception the Nieder-Weisel folk went by ship to Melbourne, usually via England. They met up with other German speakers in Melbourne and walked to the Ballarat goldfields where they met wtih friends and relatives. Those who stayed after the gold rushes settled in the centre of Victoria, from Ballarat to Bendigo to Yackandandah.

Both groups came from Lutheran areas in Europe. In Victoria a number of Nieder-Weisel folk married English or Irish partners and became attached to English-speaking churches as all Lutheran services and most social events were in German. The Wends who settled in the Western part of Victoria tended to marry Wends or Germans and remained connected to the Lutheran Church. So far we haven't found any Wends who married Nieder-Weisel folk, but it probably happened somewhere in Victoria.

When one reads of the experience of the Nieder-Weisel people you can further appreciate that some people left Europe because of the wars and compulsory military service. As a reward for winning the battle that took the Nieder-Weisel village, Napoleon's soldiers were given more than a day when they could rampage and help themselves to anything they could lay their hands on in the district. The Nieder-Weisel people were devastated and hated the French, but some months later when the Prussians and their allies won back the area their soldiers were given the same rights. No wonder the locals ended up in poverty. Poverty was so prevalent that crime flourished. Parents sent their teenage daughters overseas rather than have them grow up in a community where morals had sunk to low depths.

We are indebted to Kelvin Williams for compiling the history of the Nieder-Weisel people before he died in 1999. One can read the excellent Nieder-Weisel Story in more detail on the website www. users.bigpond.net.au/haintz

The Nieder-Weisel descendants propose to fund and erect a plaque to honour the pioneering spirit of many German families that migrated to Victoria after 1853 from the village of Nieder-Weisel near Frankfurt am Main.


Recently, we had a request from Dr Cameron Hazlehurst of Australian National University for information on Lawrence Vivian WOTZKO, Service Number 2366, RAAF Sergeant Pilot who was believed killed on 4 August 1942 when two aircraft collided during a formation flying exercise. At the time of his death he was a flying instructor.

Dr Hazlehurst writes "I am writing a book about an aircrash in Canberra in which four of Mr Wotzko's fellow members of 2 Squadron were killed, and I am keen if possible to locate letters, diaries, memoirs, or photos of men with whom they were serving at the time. Mr Wotzko had flown with Bob Hitchcock who was captain of the crashed plane."

#### Here are some tips for searchers:

- (1) To save time, send as much information to Wendsonline about the ancestors, such as full names, spouse, village of origin, names of ships, year of birth and arrival in Australia if you have them.
- (2) Many Public Libraries throughout Australia carry CD sets of all the Births, Deaths and Marriages of South Australians. They include search facilities where one enters the Family Name and all the results are listed, sometimes in the hundreds. Phone your Library and ask if they carry the CD's.
- (3) The Wendish Society has records collected by Dr George Nielsen on about 250 Australian Wendish Families. The society has put these on computer and we send the relevant pages by email when a request is made for family information.
- (4) We also have over 900 church records on computer of Pastor Kappler from about the 1850's onwards and these can be emailed to you. Both Kappler and Nielsen records are sent free by email to members and ask for a donation of \$30 from non-members. Membership is \$20 per annum.

#### Kottmann - Bruhn

Erich Kottmann, a claviola expert of Remscheid, today in the German Federal State of North Rhine-Westphalia, came to Australia in 1912 under contract with the music company Allan & Co. and married Frieda Bruhn in 1914. Research is looking also into the Kerr family connections.

#### Mittag - Lubahn

Wilhelm Johann Ludwig Mittag, a pianoforte maker of Schwerin, today in the German Federal State of Mecklenburg-Vorpommern, and his wife Emma née Lubahn and family arrived in Melbourne in 1908; he helped to set up the Wertheim piano factory in Richmond, a building occupied today by TV Channel 9. Research is looking also at the Krueger and Fischer family connections.

#### Popp - Cassuben

Joachim (Jochen) Popp, a seaman of Finkenwerder, today part of the City of Hamburg, settled in Victoria in 1870 and became a miner at Deep Lead, Stawell. He was naturalised in 1873. His descendants discovered that their ancestry goes back to connections with Urbanus Rhegius (1489–1541), a contemporary of Martin Luther. Also research into the Cassuben side of the family.

### Theiss - Fatum (Feitum/Fetum)

The Theiss family of Lindenstruth, today part of Reiskirchen, a town ca. 11 km east of Giessen, today in the German Federal State of Hesse. The research goes back to the marriage in 1847 of Heinrich Theis and Eisabetha Margretha Fatum (Feitum) at Lindenstruth.

# Wehl – (von) Mueller

Dr Eduard (Edward) Wehl, a physician from Celle, today in the German Federal State of Lower Saxony, married Clara, the sister of Ferdinand (later Baron von) Mueller, in 1853. Research into members of the extended Wehl family and the Mount Gambier connection.

- (11) Australian Lutheran magazine complete from the first issue in 1913 through to the last in 1966 is now available in our library on fully searchable CDs. The Australian Lutheran was the nationwide magazine for the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Australia. The magazine includes information on specific events and people, including marriages, deaths and obituaries.
- (12) Moments and memories by Ray Burger. Ray has written his own life story in the context of the historical record of the Burger family in Australia. The Burger ancestors, Peter and Agnes Burger (nee Schmidt) and their three children left Hochkirch in south east Germany in 1851. In 1853 they purchased land at Gnadenthal, near Penshurst, in the Western District of Victoria. The original Burger wattle and daub "pug" cottage still stands to this day.
